Expect the Unexpected: Be Open to Possibilities

The heat of the day on which I'm writing to you has me remembering the story of Abraham sitting outside his tent by the oaks of Mamre "in the heat of the day." Obviously, Abraham didn't have a nice sea breeze there, so I'm reminding myself not to complain because I can go outside and sit in the shade under the locust tree between the church and the thrift shop and enjoy a bit of breeze. But that scene from Genesis 18 is at the beginning of one of my favorite Bible stories, a story that I selected for my ordination day. It's the story when God announced that God (always doing a new thing!) was going to do something utterly unbelievable in Abraham and Sarah's life. This is the story where the Lord visits Abraham when three travelers stop by Abraham's tent and Abraham shows them hospitality in serving them food and drink, washing their feet and resting. While they were visiting, Sarah was listening from the other side of the tent entrance. When the visitors told Abraham the divine intention that the next time the visitors came by, Sarah would be with child, Sarah laughed! In my case, it wasn't a child that was gestating but a call to ministry, and it reminds me still that we are never too old, nor too settled in our ways, nor too -- you fill in your own word here, tired, busy, whatever - for God to work amazing things in our lives.

Ask me any time, and I'll tell you about my call to ministry; it's a bit too long to re-tell in a newsletter story! But the point, I think,

is always to expect the unexpected when it comes to our always-

creating, always-loving, always gracious God! To be open to the possibilities! To say yes!

While many churches slow down during the summer, we here at Trinity are in the beginning of our church fiscal year, and we've kind of hit the re-set button! well as Picnic and Sunset Vespers at Plum Cove beach. The Seaside Strummers ukulele group will have its initial meeting in August, and our Scripture Prayer Group will begin in August as well. We plan to gather back in the sanctuary for Sunday worship on August 1st, as long as the community recovery from Covid continues.

Open and Affirming Exploration

One of the particular items Trinity asked Pastor Norma to do – and she agreed! – is to explore with us an Open and Affirming designation for our church.

Open and Affirming (ONA) is a designation that began in the United Church of Christ in 1984 when the Massachusetts Conference adopted the first Open and Affirming resolution in the UCC. The following year, the UCC General Synod adopted a resolution "Calling on United Church of Christ Congregations to Declare Themselves Open and Affirming." Since then, updated resolutions have been passed, and hundreds of congregations, campus ministries, conferences and other Church bodies of the United Christ. When a church covenants to be Open and Affirming, it is saying that we welcome and affirm into the full life and ministry of the church persons of all sexual orientations, gender identities and gender expressions.

It's important to realize, though, that the spirit of ONA is more than affirming people of all sexual orientations, gender identities and expressions. The meaning of an ONA declaration should be the commitment to affirm *every* person because they

are children of God - those of any age, ability, race, culture and ethnicity, family configuration, health status, immigration status, whether with children or not, as well as any other description that



might separate us. A true welcome respects and honors every person, their story, their gifts and their needs. A welcome to some but not others is no real welcome.

In order for a church to be listed ONA by the Coalition, it must present a covenant that makes reference to the inclusion of people of all sexual orientations, gender identities and gender expressions. There are examples that we can use to guide us. In addition, nearly all churches choose to expand their welcome to name other groups that have been oppressed and include them in their welcome covenant. If we choose to become an Open and Affirming Congregation, we will discern together what our covenant will be.

If you're interested in helping with this process – and it is a process! – please let Pastor Norma know. She'll be getting a team together over the summer with an eye to beginning our explorations together in the fall!

Council's In-Person Service Protocols

Church Council is making plans to allow us to resume in-person Services, August 1, 2021. We will be asking everyone to adhere to the following protocols to promote safety and to make our worship as welcoming as we can to any of God's children who may attend and praise God together with us. As part of our protocols we will not be singing in the sanctuary in August. In addition, we are looking at the very recent reports regarding the Delta variant, and whether that will have any effect on our projected dates. We will keep you informed.

Our in-person protocols include:

- If not vaccinated, wear a mask.
- To accept Communion in pre-packaged containers.
- To look for the Offering at the back of church.
- To honor distancing between pods—the sanctuary will be marked off.
- To refrain from holding of hands or singing

Most importantly, to remember we are a community struggling with best practices in a pandemic. Please allow Council to review and adjust as time goes on and people get more comfortable.


Summer Spiritual Nourishment

place will be by the big rocks on left. Look for the bright red **Trinity** Church ban-



Sunset, a picnic, vespers, and YOU! What could be better?! Please join us for Supper Picnics and Vespers at Plum Cove Beach.


We'll meet enjoy and one another's company while we eat a light picnic, then pray vespers together as the sun sets. Please

Prayer Rock, Bristol Vermont



The Lord's Prayer Rock is located in Bristol VT—it remains as it was, and in the same location, when it was carved 125 years ago in 1891!

The carving idea is attributed to Dr. Joseph C. Greene. Since his death, there have been two versions of how this idea came to be a reality. Which "version" seems more plausible? Without proper documentation, subsequent generations are left to wonder.

"The first version is that, as a young Quaker boy, <Dr. Greene> drove heavy loads of logs along the Nine Bridge Road to the mill in The second version of the story is that lumbermen traveled the Nine Bridge Road bringing heavy loads of logs to the mill. In the winter, the grade of the road made it nearly impossible to travel into Bristol Village. To urge their "teams" onward, they resorted to "rough language". In turn, the good doctor decided to carve these words as a gentle reminder to the lumbermen to "watch their language".

Updates: Bible Study and Seaside Strummers


Bible study

Sailing History



Roy McCauley's photography skills capture our imagination.

Only a few weeks ago, the Fuller shallop - a replica of the shallop brought to America aboard the Mayflower in the 17th century—stopped in Gloucester. Roy caught a glimpse as it was on its way to Plymouth to be reunited with the restored Mayflower II.

The Pilgrims used the shallop—a 33' open vessel—to explore the coastline of what is now Massachusetts. It is reportedly the vessel the Pilgrims used to discover Plymouth Harbor.
